

TABLET SALES TO RISE

The NDP's DisplaySearch Tablet Quarterly report estimates that tablet sales will increase from 72.7 million units in 2011 to 383.3 million by 2017. Some of the key factors spurring growth include new opportunities in emerging markets, such as India and China, as well as improvements to the tablet platform, such as higher pixel densities and improved performance. NDP forecasts that emerging markets will account for 46% of worldwide shipments in 2017, which would be an increase from the 36% in 2011.



In terms of total revenue, in-app purchases are expected to overcome paid downloads by 2014.

IN-APP PURCHASES DOMINATE SMARTPHONE APP BUSINESS

If you're looking for the easiest way to make money on a smartphone app, consider creating a free app and offering in-app purchases. The IHS Screen Digest Mobile Media Intelligence Service found that 39% (\$970 million) of the total market revenue from smartphone apps came from in-app purchases in 2011. The report also indicates that 96% of all smartphone apps that were downloaded in 2011 were free. By 2015, IHS estimates that 64% of the total market revenue for smartphones will come with in-app purchases, and it will account for \$5.6 billion.

APPLE IS BACK

The introduction of the iPhone 4S helped put Apple back into the top spot for the fourth quarter of 2011.

APPLE RETAKES SMARTPHONE LEAD

In the third quarter of 2011, Apple briefly lost its No. 1 rank in smartphone shipments to Samsung. The introduction of the iPhone 4S helped put Apple back into the top spot for the fourth quarter of 2011, according to a recent report from iSuppli. Apple experienced a 117% quarterly growth from the third guarter to the fourth guarter with a shipment of more than 37 million iPhones in Q4. In terms of overall smartphone shipments for 2011, Samsung (95 million shipments) topped Apple (93 million shipments).






Windows 8 Pains 'n' Gains

Notes From The Bleeding Edge. . .

If you haven't heard that Windows 8 is coming, you are in the minority. Microsoft is spending millions of dollars on media campaigns to make sure that you know it. Why do we care? Because it is the first big change to the Windows interface since Windows 95, and it is very ambitious in scope. Windows 8 is intended to run on ARM processors in addition to Intel/AMD x86 processors, which aims it squarely at the tablet/smartphone market in addition to the PC market. The raging question is, can Microsoft actually make an interface that works on everything from designed to work on netbook/tablet/smartphone devices with touchscreens.

Microsoft just released the next beta of windows 8 which they are calling a "Consumer Preview". (Guess this is Microsoft language for "beta".) The big step up from the Developers Preview is the improvements to the Metro interface, as well as some enhancements to the conventional mouse and keyboard interface. It gives us a fuller picture of what the final product will be like.



New old desktop

smartphone screens to vast desktop monitors?

Microsoft's reason for doing this is apparent to any market watcher: All the personal device sales growth is in tablet computers and smartphones, where Microsoft is conspicuously absent. All of these devices use processor architecture where Intel is conspicuously absent. Intel's response to this is their Ultrabook technology, bringing Intel processors to the netbook/tablet/smartphone market; Microsoft's response is Windows 8, with interface changes

Hey! -- Where's the Start Button???

Installing Windows 8 Consumer Preview on a CTL 2goPad SL10 tablet computer is familiarly Windows 7-like – very few questions asked, then a 30 minute install and setup gets you to Metro, where Windows 8 starts. First noticeable difference from the Developer Preview version is Metro's background. Gone is the garish green of Developer Preview, replaced by a tranquilizing teal with a subtle bubble pattern in the background. Somewhere in the future must come the ability to select your own background, like on the traditional desktop, (and like on *Continued on page 6*

the iPad and Android) but so far -- get used to teal.

While the slant of this series is the tablet-centric Metro interface, certain features prompted me to put it on a conventional laptop as well. The victim – er, candidate is an overworked Dell Latitude E6510 with an Intel 2.8 GHz Core i5 CPU and 6 GB of DDR3 RAM. This machine is already crowded with Windows 7, Linux Mint 12 and Ubuntu on that takes you back to Metro, where Microsoft clearly wants you to start things.

While in Metro, look around. A strong sense of exploration is useful here. Of course, left-clicking a Tile launches an application. Right-clicking a tile selects it and raises a context-sensitive taskbar at the bottom of the screen, allowing such things as pinning and unpinning the launcher


12.04 beta, but an additional partition accommodated Windows 8 Consumer Preview with little strain. Inspiration for testing on this platform comes from its multi-touch touchpad which lends itself to touch-centric

interfacing in addition to seeing how Windows 8 works with a more PC conventional keyboard and pointing device. (Plus, you don't get fingerprints on the screen...)

There are many enhancements to

Metro in Consumer Preview over Developer Preview. As the names imply, Consumer Preview is much more user friendly and has many more methods for accomplishing tasks. The login screen still front-ends with a wallpaper, but now you may either swipe (tablet-style), press any key (laptop style), or click-anddrag (desktop style) to open up the login screen dialog.

The biggest culture shock to the PC trained and PC brained is what happens next: you wind up in Metro rather than a traditional desktop, populated with several Tiles which you use to launch applications and tasks. There is a rather large Tile that goes to the desktop. Clicking on that takes you to the familiar Windows desktop, where the Taskbar presents the next big culture shock. There is no Start button, How do you start anything? Moving the cursor to the lower left corner of the screen where the Start button used to be raises a flyout miniature of Metro. Clicking



to the desktop Taskbar, uninstalling the program, and deleting the tile. Right clicking on several tiles sequentially makes multiple selections, allowing

for multiple deletions -- useful for reducing clutter on the Metro desktop. Resizing Metro style tiles can enhance prominence of often used applications while

reducing the size of lesser used applications can also ease the screen clutter. (Note that this only works on Metro apps: Conventional Windows apps tiles cannot be resized.)

Moving the cursor to the lower left corner produces a miniature flyout of the desktop; clicking on that takes you back to the desktop.

Back in Metro, moving the cursor to the bottom of the screen fades in a horizontal scrollbar which lets you scroll through the Metro interface to find the tile you are seeking. Of course, using a touch screen or multi-touch touchpad, you may swipe your way from one end to the other. Unlike iPad and Android, Metro tiles are not grouped into individual desktops, but strung out sequentially in the order that applications are installed. Metro's desktop is contiguous and you scroll through it horizontally from one end to the other. It grows as you install applications and

their tiles are added to Metro. (Installing a conventional Windows app puts tiles in Metro instead of items in the Programs menu.) Tiles may also be rearranged by dragging them to the location you desire, or simply deleted if you don't use them. The whole process of managing Tiles has devices, Search and Start, which takes you (once again) to Metro. Accessing Control Panel here from the traditional desktop brings up the Control Panel we are accustomed to from Windows 7. Accessing Control Panel this way from Metro brings up the new Metro style


the flavor of managing the All Programs menu in previous Windows versions: It's somewhat tedious.


Pinch-zoom works in Metro if you have a multi-touch screen or multi-touch trackpad. This is useful for gaining an overall view of what's in Metro without having to scroll from one end to the other. (This becomes more desirable the more you install things and populate Metro with Tiles.) For conventional pointing devices, a small zoom button shows up at the right end of the scroll bar on the bottom of the screen. Clicking it will zoom out, revealing the entire Metro desktop. Clicking it again toggles out to Metro's default view.

Windows 8 uses every corner of the screen to access different functions. Lower left toggles between Metro and the traditional desktop, Upper left opens a ribbon of running application thumbnails on the left side of the screen which functions similarly to the traditional Taskbar. Upper right and lower right corners produce an icon bar that gives access to computer functions such as shutdown.

simpler Control Panel with access to some but not all of the same functions.

All of the above seems to be the tip of the iceberg in Windows 8. Consumer Preview introduces a fuller picture of what Microsoft has in mind for Windows 8.

Did I say "Apps Store"? This is one of the biggest paradigm shifts for Microsoft yet. The idea is the same as that pioneered by Apple and copied by Android. Metro style apps. games, music and other media will be available through Microsoft's Apps Store. On the Windows Phone this is presently known as Marketplace, and is the source for mostly media and games, plus a few apps. Microsoft will fold this into the new Apps Store, which will be the principle source of Metro apps for everything that runs Windows 8. End of the software CDs and DVDs? Not likely. but with so much commercial software available by download now, this will certainly be a big part of the Windows 8 marketing model. Apps Store is vastly underpopulated for now, but expect more on this later.

Ah, Spring! And a dedicated penguinista turns his thoughts to -- Ubuntu!

April is when Ubuntu springs. For those of you who aren't converted yet, Ubuntu

releases their upgrades every six months, on an April -October schedule. Version numbers indicate the release

dates thus: 11.10 is the October 2011 release, and 12.04 is the upcoming April 2012 release. So, until Spring is sprung, we get to play with the beta version of 12.04.

I've fallen into the pattern of installing the Beta versions of Ubuntu to play with while using the release version



of Linux Mint to do work without getting crashed out. Thus, the Ubuntu 12.04 beta 2 just out is the entertainment of the month.

This is the third upgrade of Ubuntu's Unity since it was first released. Ubuntu is sticking with it despite the recently released GNOME 3. The new Unity is based on GNOME 3, but Ubuntu has kept their own interface, using GNOME the old GNOME 2, which linux geeks understood well enough to create all sorts of customization tools. With all the changes in GNOME 3, it seems our gadget geeks are still wrapping their heads around them.

In the meantime, I'll just have to live with the lack of customization. I desperately want a theme for GNOME 3. I just may have to (shudder) program one. . .

3 for the underpinnings. Unity's relative maturity shows up in the pre-release of Ubuntu 12.04 as more polished and sporting some new usability enhancements. They've worked on the eye candy too, and the look-and-feel of the whole thing seems more polished.

Presentations: Diane presented tips and useful information.

BeLarc Advisor (belarc.com) will scan your computer and generate a report about your computer—software keys, version numbers, hardware information, updates available. The new version includes a network map. Run this free utility to get a current profile of your system, print and save the information in case of emergency or before upgrading.

Diane offered some tips on Searching in Google.

» If you want to look up a phrase, put it in "quotes" to make the phrase searched as a whole. To eliminate a given word, put a space after your first phrase, then a minus sign before the term you do not want to get.

» To search a specific site for a term, enter (the word/ phrase you are searching for)_site:(SiteName). ~_phrase will find sites with your phrase.

» "Search Term"_filetype:(doc, pdf, etc.) will find you files of the type you want with the search term you need.

» PutanOR (in caps) between two or more terms to find sites that have one or the other term. Phonebook510-874-3700 will find all the sites that include the target phone number (Note: no space).

» In the search window, enter "James Buchanan" 1928..1940 will find the target search to the specified dates. Note the two dots.

» To look up a word, in the search window, type Define: Your term.

» In the Google Tool Bar, click on the camera and Google will match similar images to the one you upload.

» The News button lets you search for news and different kinds of newspapers and archives.

» The Books tool searches for books by a variety of criteria.

» The Translate tool has many language pairs, looks at alternate choices, and has a read-aloud option.

» People are familiar with Google Maps. The Street View lets you see distant places.

» Check the More and Even More sections for an amazing array of things to check out.

Google+ is the Google social network. With Google Plus, you can control your circle(s) of contact and who gets what messages from you.

Google Hangout is a way to bring up to 10 people together for live chatting, using the camera and microphone in your computer. You can talk with and see people, and share the screen of a participant. Be aware that the person who initiated the Hangout doesn't retain control.

After the break, Chuck demoed "How To Remove Your Google Web History." The presentation will be on the PCC website.

While figuring out how to remove his web history, Chuck found Google.com/dashboard for managing one's online presence in Google apps.

The Experts were asked about browser screen overwriting (one line of print covering another). It might be due to too large a screen size or too large a system font size. Change Font Size in the System settings or check your drivers. Browser settings and System setting are independent of each other and both should be checked. Holding down the Control key and scrolling your scroll wheel will enlarge and reduce the screen in many applications.
